Eric Brink (GCA Treasurer)

Bob Whear (GCA President)

I have lived in Nevada since 1960 and graduated from Douglas County High School in 62'. I subsequently received a BS degree in horticulture from UNR, married my loving wife, Twyila, and moved back to Carson Valley in 1969 to start a business and raise our three children here. In 1971 I built our first self- storage facility in Gardnerville, and then continued to expand additional facilities throughout northern Nevada. I also owned and operated a cattle ranch. When I sold the ranch, I moved to Genoa Lakes.

I've been very involved in this community all these years, including being elected to the Douglas County School board, and a 40+ year member of the Minden Rotary Club, serving as president in 1979. My heart and soul are in this valley. When I was asked to become a board member of the GCA, I jumped at the chance to volunteer. My parents are buried in the cemetery, and it holds a very special place in my heart. For the last 16 years I have spent countless hours at the cemetery, especially in the capacity of handling landscaping, grading, irrigation and overall maintenance of this beautiful property.

Candy Dance Parking: Questions & Answers

Q. How long has the Genoa Cemetery Association allowed Candy Dance parking at the cemetery?

A. The first formal agreement between the GCA and the Town to allow Candy Dance parking at the cemetery was in 1998.

Q. Why does the GCA allow Candy Dance parking at the cemetery?

A. Candy Dance is the major source of funding for the Town of Genoa's operating budget. Providing a place for patrons to park on the north side of Genoa supports the Town. While it is true that the cemetery lies just outside of the official Town boundaries, its history is entwined with that of the Town (hence the name Genoa Cemetery).

Q. Is all Candy Dance parking at the Cemetery paid parking by festival goers?

A. No. Candy Dance volunteers are given special passes that allow them to park at the cemetery for free.

Q. How much did the Genoa Cemetery Association receive for 2023 Candy Dance Parking?

A. The GCA received a flat fee of \$1,500 in 2023 and \$1,000 in 2022. These funds help with the maintenance and upkeep of the Cemetery.

Q. How often is public event parking allowed at the Genoa Cemetery?

A. Once per year during Candy Dance.

Q. Is it true that Candy Dance parking is allowed throughout the cemetery?

A. No. Candy Dance parking is only allowed within the undeveloped part of the cemetery adjacent to Jacks Valley Road. Temporary fencing clearly identifies where parking is allowed (and not allowed).

Q. What about the claim that tire marks were found on a gravesite after the 2022 Candy Dance?

A. There is no proof that any graves containing human remains were disturbed by Candy Dance parking. What is known is that some time after Candy Dance, a former GCA Board member mentioned that he saw tire marks on an uncurbed, vacant area of the cemetery on the Sunday of Candy Dance. He assumed the tire marks were the result of Candy Dance parking.

Q. Can family members and other loved ones visit a grave during Candy Dance?

A. Absolutely. The parking professionals handling Candy Dance parking will move the temporary fencing to give those visiting loved ones access to the gravesites.

Q. What precautions were taken to preserve the integrity of the cemetery during Candy Dance?

- A. In 2023, the following precautions were implemented:
- * The Town installed temporary barriers in the Cemetery that separated the unused portion from the occupied portion (including a buffer).
- * The Town Manager contracted with Marines stationed at the Marine Mountain Warfare Training Center in Bridgeport to manage parking at the Cemetery.
- * Portable toilets were not allowed on Cemetery property.

Q. What issues arose in 2023 regarding Candy Dance parking?

A. Minimal amounts of litter were found and immediately picked up by the Marines and Board members who frequently inspected the parking area on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Monday of Candy Dance weekend. An external contractor also staged a porta potty (locked and on a trailer) for a short period of time on the Monday after Candy Dance while removing the temporary fencing.

Caring for our cemetery

Making sure the cemetery grounds are properly maintained is a key responsibility of the Board. In some cases, the Board hires contractors, but Board members personally take care of the irrigation system and did the roadway work themselves. Here are some of the components that make up caring for our cemetery:

Weed Control The entire cemetery must be sprayed, sometimes twice a season. A pre-emergent is applied before the last Spring snow/rain. For general weeds that have germinated, we apply another foliar treatment. Some years, we may need intermittent spot spraying and hand hoeing.

Pest control To prevent infestation of Elm beetles, the Elm trees need to have a chemical applied to the soil in the Spring. Like the rest of Northern Nevada, we have the pesty ground squirrels and gophers. Man has not come up with an effective method of controlling these critters. Our front rock wall has vines planted along the length of the landscaping that are susceptible to spider mites. To control their infestation, a dormant spray must be applied early as the new growth starts to appear.

Water system The water system, including the well, pressure system and irrigation, must be drained and winterized in the Fall and recharged in the Spring. The drip system on the trees and shrubs needs constant repair and maintenance.

Streets and Erosion Every year storm runoff causes havoc with the roadways in the cemetery. Last year, we went to a coarser aggregate and spread it generously on the road surface. So far, we think it will help the erosion issue. The road bed is smoother, cleaner, and more stable.
